

Welcome to the Counseling Corner!

South Plainfield Middle School 7th grade students started attending the We're Not Buying it Program in early January. This program educates our students about media literacy and the impact of substance use. The weekly lessons are provided by Wellspring Prevention instructors and will continue through February.

South Plainfield Middle School 8th grade students have been exploring their interests and beginning to think about their future in High School. Students have taken the opportunity to meet with the 8th grade counselor and discuss future career goals along with exploring how their interests and personalities can impact their careers. Students were made aware of opportunities including the Middlesex County Magnet schools with a variety of programs to choose from.

The High School counselors visited the Middle School to share an overview, acquainting our students with the High School. This included an introduction including scheduling, the course selection process, graduation requirements, as well as content area and athletic information. Parents were also encouraged to attend the night presentation reviewing all the information students received. All 8th graders have access to the High School slide show via Mrs. de Mello's Google Classroom-it is posted for students to reference as needed.

The Junior Journalist program has awarded more than 400 winners and provided more than 4,000 dinners during its 20-year tenure.




