SLP'S ROLE IN LITERACY

Speech-language pathologists are one of many specialists who can help children with literacy and pre-literacy skills. SLPs have a background in phonics, learning, special education, and speech production, and many have specialized training in literacy, dyslexia, and other relevant areas. This is just one of the reasons that having a SLP on your team can benefit a child. During reading assessments, a SLP can work with teachers to help determine which errors in young students are reading errors, and which may be due to their speech production. They can also help support children in essential pre-literacy and literacy skills like print concepts and sound knowledge.

Did you know that children with difficulty producing speech sounds often have more difficulty with reading and spelling skills?

Speech sound production and literacy use many similar skills, such as non-language cognition, vocabulary, letter knowledge, and phonological awareness.

This may be why we often see difficulty in literacy skills with those children who also have trouble producing speech sounds (Overy et al., 2020).

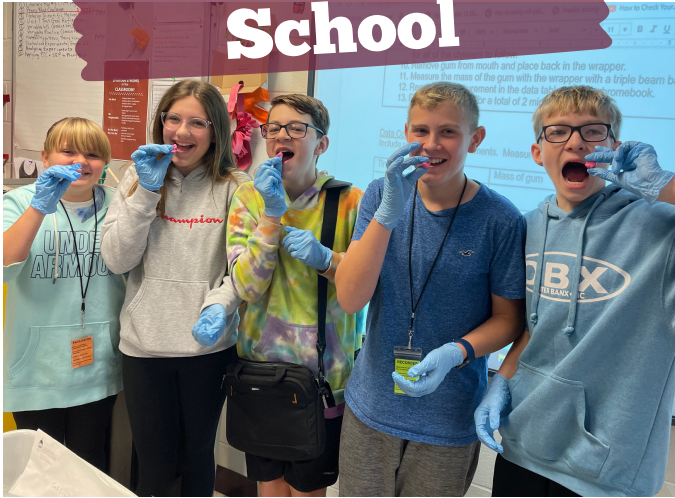

BUBBLE GUM LAB

7th grade science students recently completed their "Bubble Gum Lab." Using everything that they had learned about measuring, using lab equipment, graphing, scientific variables and thinking scientifically, the students worked in groups to answer the following question, "What happens to the mass of the gum when it is chewed?" Designated chewers chewed the gum for a total of 2 minutes in 30 second increments. At the end of each 30 second increment, students removed the chewed gum and measured its mass. Based on the average data from the entire 7th grade, we learned that the mass of the gum decreased from 5.0 grams to 3.6 grams.

WAYS TO MOTIVATE AND ENGAGE YOUR CHILD

It can be a difficult task to motivate and engage students to learn. Oftentimes, as caregivers, we step in to spark their motivation, but the key to long-term success is to guide our students to a path of self-motivation. According to an article by Allison Brubaker, "5 Tips on Developing Self-Motivation in Students," we must first tap into the psychological drivers within our students.

First, "Self-motivation begins with praising effort." A student may not always be quick to grasp a concept but if along the way, we praise their small accomplishments and separate effort from achievement, a student will be more motivated to put in the work and effort to achieve an end result.

Second, "Empower students to become self-motivated." Students need to feel heard and must have the opportunity to take active roles in the decision-making process for their education. For example, discuss your student's schedule. When they are in high school, allow them to choose electives that interest them. This will lead to more confidence. When they are in elementary or middle school, work together to discuss the expectations for their school work.

Third, "Make learning exciting." Whenever there is an opportunity to connect learning to hands-on activities, go for it! This can foster curiosity and build excitement. In addition, something like a reward system can help a student work toward their goals.

Fourth, "Talk about future goals to help students stay motivated". Setting short-term goals which encourage the attainment of long-term goals can help students see the value in their work. SMART goals are the best way to do this. SMART stands for Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, and Time-bound. Anyone can set a goal but if it isn't these five things, it will become harder to attain.

Fifth, "Stay connected with your self-motivated student". Talk with your student. Check in on their goals and progress. As caregivers, you can be your child's biggest cheerleader and encouraging them can help give them the confidence to achieve great things.

There will always be students that seem to have been born possessing the internal motivation and engagement to go to school each day, ready to learn. Whereas others may need more support and encouragement to build that self-motivation. At GCS, it is our hope that we can partner with caregivers and students to reach this goal.
