Teachers & Students

- *Monday, March 30 to Wednesday, April 1:* Teachers can lead mini-lessons to provide background information and prepare students for the press conference. Some examples of mini-lessons could include:
 - o Background on the Governor and her roles and responsibilities
 - Office of Governor Raimondo's website
 - Britannica Kids Governors
 - Overview of Governor Powers & Authority
 - Fast Facts about American Governors
 - o Learning about the coronavirus, pandemics and how to help stop the spread of viruses
 - Pre-K-2: How to Talk your Kids About Coronavirus
 - Pre-K-5: Virus Information & Prevention
 - 6-12th Grade: <u>Virus Information & Prevention</u>
 - Discussing the purpose of press conferences
 - Watching one of the daily 1pm press conferences
- By Wednesday, April 1 at 12:00pm: Parents and teachers can help student's produce questions to send to the Governor ahead of the press conference. The Governor will answers student questions during the press conference.
 - o Students can submit questions via Google form (teachers or parents can do this on their behalf)
 - O Students can call (401) 222-2080 and leave a message stating their name, grade, school, town and then asking their question for the Governor

- Remind and promote the press conference with students, staff and families
- Provide flexibility in distance learning schedules so students and staff can watch the press conference

Teachers & Students

- Teachers can help set expectations for students watching the press conference
- As students watch they can practice active listening skills by taking notes and making a list of follow up questions
- Teachers can lead a follow up lesson to answer any questions the students may have and dive deeper on issues that were brought up during the press conference
- Students can write follow up letters to the Governor in response to the press conference
